

Who is a Junior Ranger?

A Junior Ranger is a person who enjoys learning about places like the Jemez Historic Site. They share what they have learned with family, friends and others so important places like Jemez Historic Site and the other New Mexico Historic Sites are remembered and respected for many years to come.

Becoming a Junior Ranger

This is the site of an ancient village, and Spanish church. The people that lived here are called Jemez People (Jemez is pronounced HAY-mess). This Pueblo (Spanish for "village") was built in the 1300s. The Jemez People also lived in many other pueblos in this area. Many of those pueblos were on the mesa tops to the East and West.

The Pueblo here at Jemez Historic Site is called "Gise'wa", which means "Place of Sulphur". The mounds of dirt and rocks are what remain of the 3-4 story Pueblo. It was made using rocks, mud and trees, and looked similar to modern apartment buildings. Pueblos normally had a plaza— open areas within a Pueblo surrounded by dwellings. Gisewa Pueblo had multiple plazas.


Modern Jemez people now live in the Pueblo of Jemez 13 miles south of here, and they believe the Pueblo of Gisewa is sacred and that it deserves respect.




The plaza was the central area of a pueblo. Many daily activities took place here.

A kiva is a special and sacred place. It is used for ceremonies and social gatherings by Pueblo People.These structures are usually round (sometimes square) and subterranean (underground).They represent origins from the underworld and remain sacred throughout the modern Pueblos.

The Franciscans


In the late 1500s, people from Spain (Spaniards) came to this area.

The Franciscans were an order of the Catholic Church. They believed that their main goal in life was to convert the Native Peoples of this land to Christianity.

The Franciscans later had the Jemez People build them a church. It was named San José de los Jemez.







The Jemez People planted corn, beans, and squash. They used a farming technique known as *dry farming*, which means that they relied mostly on the moisture from rain.

The Spaniards introduced many new things to this area: Cows, sheep, watermelon, wheat, grapes, metal, and chile.


